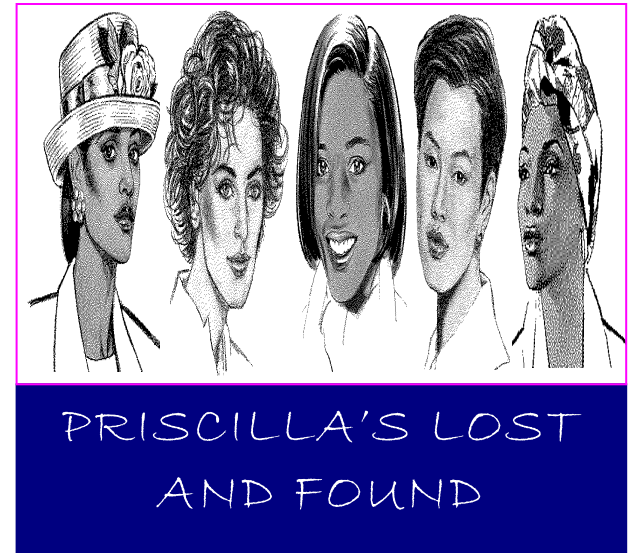

Seven characteristics of a good mentor

- Ability to see potential in another
- Tolerance with mistakes
- Flexibility in responding to people
- Patience, knowing that time is needed
- Perspective, having vision and ability to see down the road
- Gifts and abilities that build up and encourage others
- Prayerful

Mentor Qualification Agreement

- Commitment to one (1) year Covenant Agreement with mentee
- Attend mentor training workshops
- Willing to make no less than three (3) contacts per month (one must be face to face)
- Keep accurate record of time spent
- Attend monthly/quarterly meetings
- Sign a confidentiality agreement
- Must not recruit for my local church or any other church



The Basic Tools used by the mentor are:

- Listen
- Ask helpful questions
- Encourage
- Share from your own experience
- Show respect
- Make suggestions not demands
- Help develop a realistic plan of action for growth
- Let mentored know they are not alone.

The Elements of a Mentoring Relationship

- Openness
- Trust
- Accountability/Responsibility
- Empowerment
- Confidentiality
- Freedom to Challenge

Guides to being an effectively mentor

- Be yourself—be willing to share your own life experiences
- Speak truth in love— the balance of truth and love is essential
- Use wisdom—use wisdom to avoid being manipulated or drawn into unhealthy or unsafe dealings with your mentee
- Be a good listener—this sounds simple but all of us can struggle with really listening
- Treat your mentee as you would want to be treated. Take time to listen and put yourself into your mentee’s shoes.
- Be adequately prepared and on time for any meetings or outings—again, you are an example.
- Decide with the mentee what they need to work on. The mentee needs to take ownership of those areas of their life they need to work on.
